Topic: Summer Learning Enrolment Report 2018 **Submitted by:** Andrew Holland, Assistant Superintendent

The landscape of Summer Learning in Surrey continues to evolve as programs are constructed, evaluated, and adjusted to meet the educational needs of students. The Ministry of Education continues to fund Summer Learning Programs for students in 2018. At this time, there are 11,340 K-12 students enrolled in Summer Learning. Registration is ongoing, and we anticipate approximately 12,000 K-12 students will attend Summer Learning Programs for 2018. By comparison, 11,785 students attended Summer Learning Programs in 2017. Summer Learning does not charge a fee for courses.

Early Primary - Kindergarten to Grade 1

For the sixth year, an Early Primary Program is at one of our inner city elementary schools. This program is an early learning curriculum framework and targets skills and concepts in both literacy and numeracy: Anticipated number of students: 50

Summer Learning Elementary Program

This program emphasizes the need to improve the skills and confidence of students who fall into the categories of "Approaching Expectations" or "Not Yet Meeting Expectations". Students are referred to the program by their respective home schools and join a program at a district HUB school close to their home. These courses focus on literacy and numeracy: Anticipated number of students: 4400

Summer Learning French Immersion Program

Students will be registered in either Early or Late Immersion Programs at three HUB school sites: Anticipated number of students: 200

Summer Learning Fundamental Movement: Skill Development

This is an opportunity designed to improve student physical literacy. Students will participate in a variety of activities to help them build confidence in their fundamental movement skills. This pilot program is open to students currently in grades 3-5 at Jessie Lee Elementary: Anticipated number of students: 20

Enhancement / Trades Exploration / Summer Connections Programs

Specialized Student Support Programming: The Student Support Department provides summer learning opportunities for students with highly specialized needs: Anticipated number of students: 30

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Enhancement Programs: Students identified by their school to be struggling in two core academic subjects can attend district Enhancement Programs. Teachers engage students in project-based learning and experience-based study. Each site also has ten Grade 11 & 12 peer tutors who work with the students: Anticipated number of students: 1100

Trades Exploration: Grade 10 and 11 students enrolled in a Trades Exploration 10 Program at Princess Margaret Secondary where they will have the opportunity to experience four different Trades: Plumbing, Electrical, Carpentry and Welding. The goal is to expose students to these different vocations and spark interest for further study: Anticipated number of students: 20

Summer Connections: Princess Margaret Secondary, Queen Elizabeth Secondary, and Education Services School host the Summer Connections Program for youth at risk: Anticipated number of students: 100

The Aboriginal Education Department is planning two numeracy camps: Anticipated number of students: 80

The Welcome Centre will be hosting a Bridge Program at Princess Margaret Secondary and Dr. FD Sinclair Elementary for ELL Learners. There are 7 classes running this year – 4 elementary classes and 3 secondary classes: Anticipated number of students: 100

Transitions (Grade 7)

Students referred by their elementary schools will participate in the Transitions Program at 20 secondary schools in the district. This program aims to enhance the students' literacy and numeracy skills, as well as give them an opportunity to acquaint themselves with all the nuances of student life in a secondary school. There will also be a STEM Program Pilot at Pacific Heights: Anticipated number of students: 500

Academic Remedial

The Academic Remedial Program continues to facilitate opportunities for success for students who may have had difficulty during the school year. Academic Remedial courses will be at Queen Elizabeth Secondary or Clayton Heights Secondary: Anticipated number of students: 1000

Academic Full Credit

North Surrey Secondary, Queen Elizabeth Secondary, Princess Margaret Secondary, Earl Marriott Secondary and Clayton Heights Secondary will be hosting Academic Full Credit courses, which will have high school students, adult students and international students. The spectrum of courses includes core academic subjects, languages, and physical education. Students choose to take up to two academic courses: Anticipated number of students: 4400





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August 2018 Government Exam Session

During the first week of August, Summer Learning will be hosting exam sessions for English 12, Communications 12, and Numeracy Assessment.
