



IRCC Fund Usage

Settlement Workers in Schools (SWIS) Program:

- facilitate the settlement and integration of newly arrived ELL students and their families and
- provide cross-cultural education, information about schools and schooling, and information and referrals to community agencies and support programs.

At the Welcome Centre:

- School orientation and registration support
- Language assessment and placement assistance
- Community connections
- Ongoing support relating to settlement
- Extensive resource library
- Partnership programs with community-based service providers
- From January to December 2018, we welcomed almost 2,600 newcomer students into our District through the Welcome Centre


Principle-based CORE approach: New for CFP 2019

CLIENT-CENTERED

Programming that is tailored to meet specific client's profiles. This includes ensuring Francophone services for those who want to live and work in French, and a focus on clients who are vulnerable, marginalized or face barriers.

RESPONSIVE TO NEED

Programming that meets the needs of not only the client, but of society itself, to best integrate newcomers and achieve the shared vision for Settlement and Integration.



OUTCOMES-DRIVEN

Programming that is driven by evidence, ensuring the best outcomes, both short and long term, for the client.

EFFECTIVE USE OF RESOURCES

Programming that is effective and efficient, utilizing partnerships, leveraging shared resources, and developing untapped community assets such as volunteers and local businesses.

SECTION 1: Assessing against CORE Principles

CLIENT-CENTRED:

- How the client is engaged in the activity
- How programming is tailored to meet the needs of the client
- Meeting the client's official languages needs

OUTCOMES-DRIVEN:

- How the project aligns with the outcomes in the Settlement Program Logic Model
- What will the project outcomes be and how will they be measured
- How activity will be adapted based on changing needs

RESPONSIVE TO NEED:

- The need for the project is clear and supported by evidence
- How the community is being engaged
- How the project is adaptable to meet emerging needs
- Whether goals are feasible

EFFECTIVE USE OF RESOURCES:

- How the budget is balanced, with all costs and revenues itemized and explained
- How the applicant has demonstrated proper use of funds, in line with average costs for similar services in their area

CFP 2019 Process

- Launched February 18, 2019
- Application period closes April 12, 2019 at 5:00pm PST
- Surrey is coordinating with metro districts to ensure consistency with local logic models, service delivery, and budget - seeking regional alignment of proposals
- Assessment period April to August, 2019
- Funding decisions communicated by August 30, 2019
- *Contribution Agreement* negotiation will occur November 2019 to February, 2020
- Contribution Agreements will be signed in March 2020
- CFP 2019 projects will start April 1, 2020
- IRCC funding can now be up to five years (previously three years)
